For five years and ten issues, former Editor T. Whit Athey, Ph.D., guided the Journal of Genetic Genealogy from a fledgling journal to a well-respected open-access journal containing many of the most recent developments in the field of genetic genealogy.

Further, more work is needed to extend the reach of articles that appear in JoGG, including the much-discussed goal of indexing articles for PubMed and other popular indexes.

The genetic genealogy field is a close-knit one, and its oldest journal should reflect that sense of community. So please feel free to submit directly to me any suggestions, comments, thoughts, or criticisms that readers care to contribute.

Before I end, let me again thank Dr. Athey for his excellent leadership of JoGG over the past five years, and for his personal guidance and advice during this recent transition.
